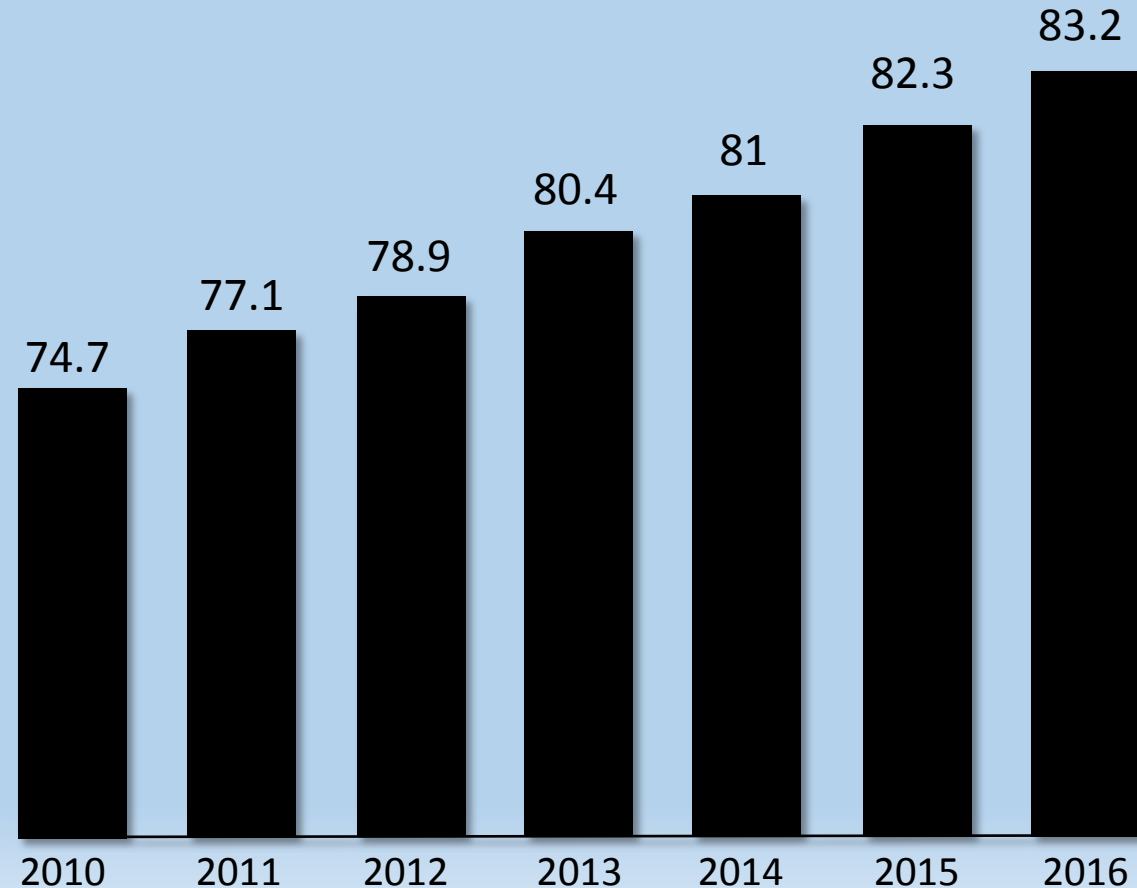

## Research Triangle International Report Shows Latino and African American Students Making Largest Gains

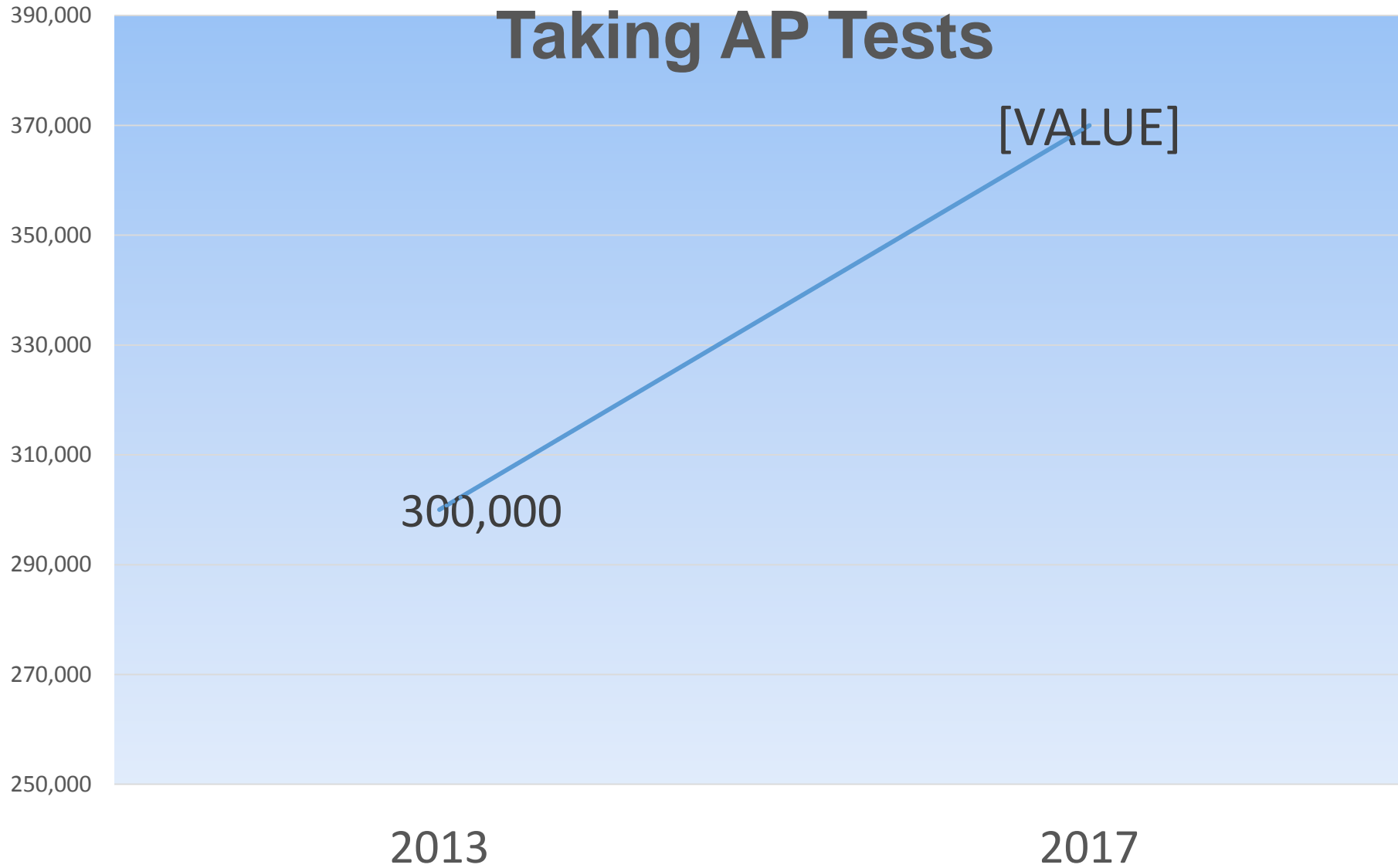
- In 2007, the eligibility gap for **CSU** between **white and Latino** students was 14.6%; **it dropped to 7.9% by 2015**
- In 2007, the eligibility gap between **white and African American** students for CSU was 13.1%; **it declined to 9.8% by 2015**
- From 2007 to 2015, the gap in eligibility for **UC** between **white and Latino students** narrowed from **7.7% to 3.4%**, and the gap between **white and African American** students dropped from **8.3% to 5.4%**

# Evidence of Progress: Significant Increase In California High School Graduation Rates

- Now at an all-time high of 83.2 percent
- Biggest increases taking place among English learners, African Americans, and Latinos.

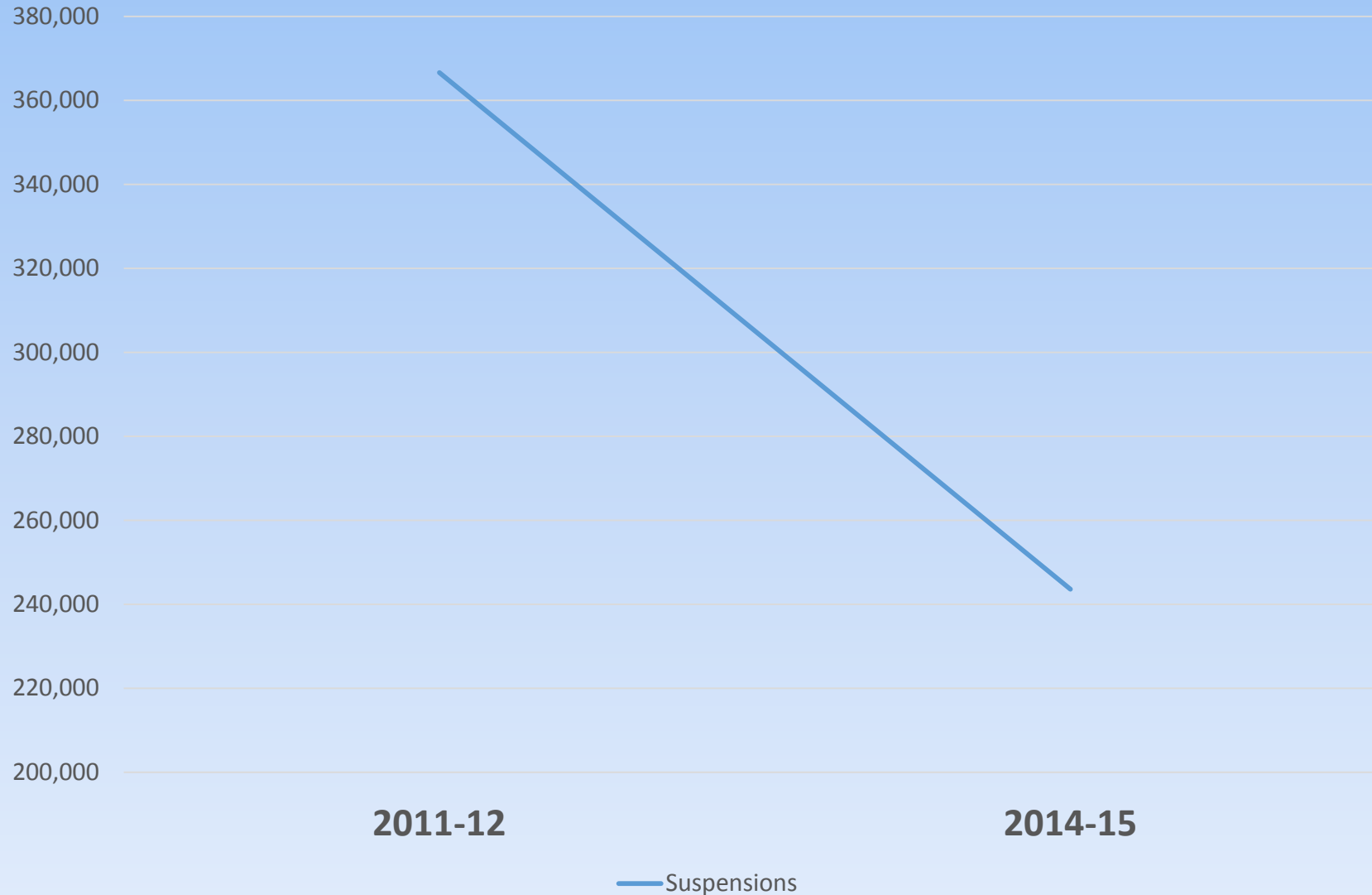


# Evidence of Progress: Students Taking AP Tests



The number who scored **3 out of 5** or better increased from **185,000** to **226,000** from 2013 to 2017.

## Evidence of Progress: Declining Suspensions



Since 2011-12, when CDE began collecting and reporting data, suspensions have declined by 33.6 percent.

Declines were reported for all student groups, and declines were greatest for Latino, African American and Native American students.
